Brief Literature Review

Sex trafficking accounts for 22% of global human trafficking (Office in Trafficking in Persons, 2015).

Sex-trafficking survivors are at-risk for suicidal ideation, dissociative reactions, solicitation charges, and addictions to substances (Litam, 2017).

A dearth of research on this topic exists in counseling journals.

Method

- Databases used: PsychINFO, Medline, PubMed, and Academic Search Complete, and Google.
- Key search terms: *screening*, *tool*, *instrument*, *sex trafficking*, *identification*, *assessment*, *trafficking*, *validity*, *sex*, *adolescent*, *commercial sexual exploitation*, and *measure*.
- The search retrieved 46 articles reviewed with the following criteria: instruments (a) used for screening or identification purposes of sex-trafficking, (b) used a structured format, (c) had an English version, and (d) were United States based.
- Articles were excluded due to difficulty in accessing instrument, instrument or measure described was not for screening or identification purposes, comprehensive human trafficking instrument that did not include items specific to sextrafficking.
- This further review identified 11 articles of which 141 items were considered for screening or identification purposes for sex-trafficking.
- The search was conducted from April 17 to May 1, 2019

Discussion and Implications

- A content analysis determined a limited number of instruments that assess specifically for sex trafficking.
- Instruments that assessed for sex trafficking focused on six major themes: (a) unstable living conditions and caregiving, (b) risk factors, (c) mental and physical health assessment, (d) forms of abuse, (e) commercial sexual exploitation, and (f) other.
- Sex trafficking instruments dedicated to assess risk of sex trafficking.
